In-Home Nurse Gerry Grey Lewis, RN gave a very enlightening talk to our new volunteers about the differences between home and inpatient services.

It started early and moved quickly through the topics needed to give volunteers a complete understanding in what to expect and how to handle different situations when working with families and patients. The Volunteer Coordinator, Jeri started the morning going over the hospice mission and history of Hospice Ministries, job description, guidelines and things volunteers could do.

A panel of veteran volunteers answered questions from the group of trainees and recounted some of their experiences which might prove helpful to the new volunteers. Panel members were Helen Anthony, Billie Carroll, Lucie Millette Phillip, John MacGregor and Don Guillory.

After a light lunch the

group was treated to talks by different members of the Hospice Team.

Home Care nurse Gerry Grey Lewis was first to talk to the group about the differences between Home Care and Inpatients Care and the Nurses' role. Richard Brogan gave us a brief description of the Faith in Action program and Charlotte Robinson lectured on the "Five Experiences of Death" and the Bereavement program.
